	SUBJECT: CENTRE81 UPDATE – October 2020			

This report is to provide the Management Committee with an update of Centre81, including events, funding, current and potential projects.

In line with current government lockdown guidance, Centre81 is currently closed to the public. We hope to re-open soon, however our main doors will be locked (with a door entry system in place) all bookings and hires will be by appointment only, this will enable us to safely monitor all visitors service users and gym members, taking temperatures, contact details for NHS Test and Trace etc.

Safety is our top priority and we are operating within all government social distancing and safety guidelines to ensure the health and safety of our staff, tenants and users. We are currently gathering all users and tenants Risk Assessments for inspection, before classes or activities can resume.

1 Projects

Appendix 1 provides a detailed breakdown of ongoing and proposed projects.

2 Community Pot

At the moment, we have c. £4.7k in our Community Pot, which can be used to fund community activities throughout the year. Once lockdown restrictions begin to ease we will start planning activities.

3 Centre81 Steering Group

During the October half term, the Centre81 Steering Group provided packed lunches over the six days, these were distributed to local young people. Approximately 50-60 lunches were provided each day. Activities for young people (primary school age only) were held in the MUGA (Multi Use Games Area) over 3 days.

The after-school youth groups are operating outside until the end of October, each Wednesday and Thursday 3:15pm-4:30pm. As the dark nights and colder weather will be with us soon, the group will be reviewing this arrangement on 26th October.

As at 15th October, the Steering Group have delivered 15 outdoor sessions at the Centre81 MUGA for primary aged young people since the beginning of August. They have been very lucky with the weather with only one call off on 27th August. They are currently planning Halloween-themed activities for this week and next.

4 Gym81

We have scheduled a service of all our Gym equipment and once this has been completed, we will carry out a deep clean of the gym area and all equipment and kit. We will then be in a position to be able to re-open the gym (in line, of course with current Scottish Government Covid-19 restrictions). A booking system will be implemented for all gym users, as well as a robust cleaning schedule.

Scottish Government (administered by Cycling UK)	Scotland Cycle Repair Scheme (additional lock- down project carried out by C81 staff)	We were awarded £2,000 from The Scotland Cycle Repair Scheme, to help local residents with the cost of repairing their bikes e.g. fixing flat tyres, loose brakes and clunky gears. The coronavirus crisis hit many people hard and this fund has helped people pay for essential bike repairs (£50 per bike).
		We have now fully completed the project with 41 repairs carried out. This project has been a great success and there has been so many lovely comments from customers picking up their bikes. In one example where we couldn't repair a bike, we provided them with a refurbished bike from our CCF project
