Welcome



During

CATHERINE BOYLE, CHAIRPERSON JUNE 2025 During the last 12 months, our management committee and staff have been continuing to focus on the health and wellbeing of our residents alongside reviewing key risks facing the organisation and we continue to address the challenges and attempt to limit the impact of the ongoing cost-of-living crisis including increasing costs.

However, despite increasing pressures and challenges, I am pleased to report that the Association continues to perform to a high standard. Our recent Tenant's Satisfaction Survey reported that 93% of the 485 tenants surveyed stated they were satisfied with the overall service that we provide and 94% of those surveyed feel their rent offers value for money.

It is is our 40th year and we aim to celebrate this anniversary with our tenants, shareholders and the community.

We started off back in 1985 as Clydebank and East Community Council Steering Group and then registered as Central and East Clydebank Housing Association with the Housing Corporation.

In 1986, we completed rehabs of 5 closes at Kilbowie Road and Alexander Street and have come a long way to where we are now with a £6m turnover, over 1,240 homes and £48m of housing assets. We have come far, and remain committed to "offering our community more than a home".

We are lucky to have Paul Shiach, our current Secretary, still on our Committee as he was one of the founding members of the original Steering Group.

We are also very proud of the many activities delivered at Centre81 in collaboration with our various partners. This year marks 17 years since we opened Centre81 and during that time, Clydebank Housing Association tenants and residents have benefitted from these services and activities.

In the last 12 months, we have spent over £1.4m on our Major Repairs programme. This investment includes the installation of new windows, bathrooms, rewiring and door entry systems.

A review of our 30-year investment programme will be carried out in the next few months, alongside the update of our Business and Financial Plans. We welcome any comments and feedback on our future plans.

We currently have no confirmed development plans for 2025/26 but we continue to work closely with West Dunbartonshire Council and we remain committed to the development and regeneration of Clydebank and our communities.

I would like to add a special thank you to my fellow Committee members for continuing to carry out their unpaid work diligently and with dedication.

They regularly give up their time to attend training courses, meetings, pop into the office and respond to emergency decisions and I thank them for this.

Our Wider Role



Centre81

We own and manage Centre81, our community and regeneration centre in the heart of our community which opened in 2008.

The Centre is home to Gym81, Café81, a community garden, raised beds area and has an outdoor multi use games area (MUGA).

We run our own activities and activities in partnership with others, including health and fitness classes, employability, English as a Second Language (ESOL), kids' club and weekly bingo. We have a project funded bike mechanic and community gardener.

We provide office space to a range of organisations, and our hall and rooms are available for hire.



CHA Power Ltd

In 2005, following consultation with tenants, we set up CHA Power Ltd, a wholly-owned subsidiary, to provide energy efficient and affordable heat and hot water through a Combined Heat and Power system (CHP).

It now provides unlimited heat and hot water to over 370 two bedroom multistorey properties, for just £16.22 (incl. 5% VAT) a week (as at 01 April 25) and also supplies the local church.

Our CHA Power plant generates electricity and, as a by-product, heat is produced and used to provide the heat and hot water to tenants whilst the electricity is sold back to the National Grid.



Clydebank Social Economy Centre (SEC)

We own and manage Clydebank SEC which opened in 2005. The 5,000ft² building offers quality, inclusive accommodation for social economy, voluntary sector and community businesses.

We are delighted that the office space is fully occupied by Community Links Scotland and Stepping Stones Mental Health Organisation.

We provided support "in-kind" and £1,400 of annual grant to Radnor Park Multis Tenants & Residents Association. This helped support their trip of over 40 residents to St Andrews. Our staff attend nearly all of the group's public meetings.







Fiona Campbell's new role of Community Support Officer, part funded by the National Lottery, continues our partnership with Knowes and Dalmuir Park Housing Associations, and will ensure that tenants and their wider families are supported within their homes for the next three years.





We held our 11th community clearout day at Radnor Park in June and tenants took advantage of this great opportunity to get rid of unwanted items in the lovely sunshine.

This event was made possible thanks to funding received from Anglian Home Improvements, who had replaced windows in Radnor Park.





The 'Red Hot Chilli Steppers', a team of 11 staff, walked 14.4 miles at the Kiltwalk on 28 April 2024 and raised a fantastic £1,465 for Accord Hospice.

We are thankful to the 285 tenants who participated in our 2023/24 Repairs and Maintenance Satisfaction Survey with independent research company, Research Resource. We saw an improvement again from the same survey carried out in 2022/23 from 90.9% to 93.7%.





We wanted to make sure that the information we are giving tenants in our Performance Report to Customers is the information tenants want, so we held a focus group in July.

An event was held for those who had an "upheld" complaint in year to check they were happy with the process.

A further focus group was held for tenants to help shape our Estate Management Policy.



Annual General Meeting



We were delighted at the success of our 39th Annual General Meeting (AGM) held at our Centre81.

Shareholders were given a warm welcome by Chairperson, Catherine Boyle, who detailed the work staff and Management Committee members had been doing in the year.



There was then an update from the Head of Housing Services on favourable performance in the year and from the Chief Executive on a robust financial position at the yearend.

Members then enjoyed a fish tea, free raffle, sweet treats, prize bingo and a dance to live music.

Work got underway on the long awaited project to connect 45
Dumbarton Road properties to the Queens Quay's District Heating
Network. This £1.2 million project is funded by the Scottish Government and the Association, through a CAF Bank Green Loan.



Window refurbishments at 119-173 Dumbarton Road and 177-189 Glasgow Road were completed.

The windows really do make a difference, not only visually, but in retaining heat in our tenants' homes.

A major investment programme to upgrade water systems at Radnor Park from a gravity fed water tank system to a mains water supply was completed.

This work removes the need for enhanced legionella testing and treatment in the flats which brings financial benefits to us and, ultimately, our tenants in the long run.

Our stock more than doubled overnight following a successful Stock Transfer from Scottish Homes in 1999. We gained 754 properties in Linnvale, Bannerman Estate, Drumry, Radnor Park and Whitecrook. We paid £2.5m for the stock and in the first 20 years alone had spent nearly £20m on the properties.

KEY FINANCIAL RESULTS

- £5.4m received in rental income with a 4.6% rent increase applied in 2024/25. £281k of income was received for our other activities (wider role, factoring etc.).
- £271k was received in bank interest. Average rate of interest receivable was 4.4% (2024: 3.1%).
- £5.2m was spent providing housing services and maintaining our existing housing stock. £478k was spent on our other activities (wider role, factoring etc.).
- 50p of every £1.00 of your rent received was spent on direct maintenance costs.
- £439k was payable for loan interest. Average rate of interest payable was 6.1% (2024: 6.9%).

- Over c. £1.56m was spent on Major Repairs in the year, including replacement programmes for windows, kitchens, rewiring and bathrooms.
- During the year to 31 March 2025, the Association purchased 2 properties through the Shared Ownership Buy Back Policy.
- The Association remains in a strong financial position with significant cash deposits available to fund its major repair investment programme over the next year and beyond.

Maintenance

We carry out repairs under various categories and provide statistical information to the Scottish Housing Regulator through the Annual Return on the Scottish Social Housing Charter (ARC). Timescales are calculated from the moment in which a repair is reported to us and in line with our Repairs and Maintenance Policy.

Tenant safety is paramount. We have a legal duty to carry out gas safety inspections each year in properties with gas appliances and the following table shows performance against our target of 100%. All services were carried out within timescale during the year.

MAJOR REPAIRS

The year saw us continue with our major repair investment programme despite the increased costs to deliver such programmes which is being seen across the sector.

Over £1.4m was spent on Major Repair contracts in the year. We continue to prioritise programmes of work relating to Health and Safety, our landlord obligations and work which we believe will help our tenants with their energy costs. Highlights for the year include the installation of district heating to 45 properties at Dumbarton Road, the upgrade of the water system to a mains supply at our multi storey flats and our window replacement programme.



PROPERTIES MEETING SCOTTISH HOUSING QUALITY STANDARD

The Scottish Housing Quality Standard (SHQS) was introduced in February 2004 and is the Scottish Government's principal measure of housing quality in Scotland.

The purpose of introducing a minimum housing standard in Scotland is essentially to provide a 'floor' below which a property should ideally not fall. The Scottish Government set a target for us to bring our stock up to every element of the standard (where applicable) by April 2015.

To evidence this the Association had completed 5 years of stock condition surveys throughout our stock. Between 2018 and 2023 we assessed 87% of stock to confirm passes, abeyances and failures and to evidence exemptions.

This information has been collated and will form the foundation of our investment programme both in the short and long term alongside our landlord obligations.

A target of a 20% of stock condition surveys has been set for 2025/2026.

Where the Association is prevented in meeting the standards, an exemption is applied. An example of this is where access has been refused for work to be carried out or where it can be evidenced that the standard cannot be met no matter what work is carried out. An abeyance is recorded where a temporary exemption is applied to a property.

MEDICAL ADAPTATIONS

During the year we carried out 20 medical adaptations. These adaptations allow tenants with changing physical needs to continue living in their home. We secured c. £22k grant funding from the Scottish Government to fund these installations all of which was spent with an additional c. £5k provided by the Association.

TENANCY SUSTAINMENT

In the first year of our Community Support Project, we continue to assist vulnerable and 'in need' tenants via support services and direct assistance in claiming welfare benefits, assistance with energy bills and furnishings, and a range of other assistance through direct means or by signposting to specialist support agencies.

During 2024/25, a total of 492 tenants received some form of assistance, with a total of £40,098 equivalent being generated in either financial or equivalent gain assistance.

The project is crucial in our ability to support tenants during these difficult times of fuel and cost of living crises.
